## EDUCATION

*Strengthening families, children and individuals to reach their full potential.*

American Red Cross served over 40,000 community members.

Big Brothers Big Sisters' Teaming Up With YOUth Moving On program served 23 sixth and seventh grade girls.

Boy Scouts helped to shape 1,600 area young men and women through 650 adult volunteer mentors.

Camp Fire served over 350 children in their before- and after-school programs.

Camp Neyati provided a unique camping experience to over 2,000 campers.

Catholic Family Service provided counseling to over 100 people in the north and west regions of the county.

Family & Children's Services engaged 68 teen mothers in Prepared Parenting classes.

Girl Scouts Heart of Michigan served 583 girls in Midland County.

Seventy area youth were served at the Midland Community Center's TRAC after-school program.

North Midland Family Center provided nearly 100 high school girls with a prom dress.

Railway Family Center helped 41 teens learn about health and fitness.

Over 28,000 Imagination Library books were distributed through Success by 6.

West Midland Family Center provided parent education classes for 30 families.

## SELF-SUFFICIENCY

*Empowering people to live independently and achieve financial stability.*

The American Red Cross awarded five heroes with the Certificate of Merit Award (for saving a life by using skill learned through the American Red Cross).

The ARC of Midland helped 120 adults who live in their own homes pay their bills and budget their money.

The Arnold Center helped get 66 clients with disabilities to and from their jobs each week.

Disability Network helped 22 people move out of nursing homes and into their own apartments.

Family & Children's Services were able to serve over 80 individuals in immediate crisis.

Hidden Harvest delivered over 1.2 million pounds of rescued food, that would have otherwise gone to waste.

Literacy Council tutored more than 250 job seekers in math and basic reading skills.

72 low-income families were able to stay in their homes through repair services by Midland Area Homes.

The Midland Community Center facilitated free tax return preparation for over 1,000 area residents.

The Salvation Army provided 15,562 meals to underprivileged children.

Shelterhouse supplied 4,302 nights of shelter to victims of domestic violence.

2-1-1 Northeast Michigan assisted 8,265 callers in need in Midland County.

West Midland Family Center provided after-school care for 80 children.

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## HEALTH

Cancer Services provided over 170 smokers with help to stop smoking.

68 teen mothers participated in Prepared Parenting classes through Family & Children's Services

Midland Community Center had 215 adults in their "Lose to Win" program, shedding a combined 1,939 pounds.

Safe & Sound Child Advocacy provided 151 young victims of abuse with loving, safe forensic interviews.

Senior Services provided 2,545 hours of respite care for area seniors.

Ten Sixteen Recovery Network provided 4,329 days of care to 216 people striving to live a happy, sober life.

West Midland Family Center provided nearly 400 home visits by family mentors.

Our community donated 10,000 Sharing Tree gifts to local neighbors in need, valued at over 288,000.
